Getting that professional polish

Library writing workshop

TEENS DON MASKS TO STIMULATE CREATIVITY AT YOUNG VOICES WRITING WORKSHOP.

Teens were treated to an evening of fun, as they gleaned tips for improving their creative writing at a workshop with Toronto writer Karen Krossing held at North York Central Library on February 20. Sanjeev Narayanaswamy participated in the workshop and reports.

The writing workshop was very useful for me and other students who like to write, but just can't get that professional polish on their work.

The first activity was like this: Ms. Krossing passed around a "treasure" box full of words. We were to pick three words each from the box and spend two minutes writing a story with those words in it. When all of us were done, we had to guess the words in each others' stories.

Next, we attempted to describe a villain. After that we characterized a hero. Finally, we combined the two descriptions to write a scene featuring those two characters.

Now came the best part: the masks! Ms.

Krossing took out dozens of masks and told us to put one on to help make us think more like the characters we were to write about. This was a great idea, and since we had mirrors, we could instantly put ourselves in the shoes of the characters we each chose. Ms. Krossing gave us a situation: a person, known to all of the characters the students were impersonating, had died and each character had to write a response. That activity marked the end of the session.

I learned a lot of tips, for example, Ms. Krossing explained that, "too much description can be boring; use only as much as you think is enough."

It was impossible to not have fun in the workshop because Ms. Krossing is a great teacher and the activities are really well thought out. I hope other people can enjoy the opportunity to do writing workshops at the library as much as I did.

There were plenty of options for visitors to the *Exposed: Core Expressions of Toronto Youth* art show. They could take in 80-odd pieces of striking artwork, nibble on bruschetta and other tasty finger foods, and check out live rock bands, all in the same space. It all happened on the second floor of the Northern District Branch on March 8.

An all-ages audience flowed through the library corridors, stopping now and then to examine a unique piece of art or to watch a band rock out. The visual art came in a variety of mediums, from oil to acrylic, silkscreens to scratched CDs – even a few spray-painted car doors – while the performances ranged from soft jazz to classic rock to funk to hardcore.

Prior to the event, Delisle Youth Services spent hours framing and arranging all the artwork while ND's Youth Advisory Group coordinated the band line-up. In the end, all the hard work paid off, resulting in a lively show that showcased the wide-ranging talents of Toronto's youth.

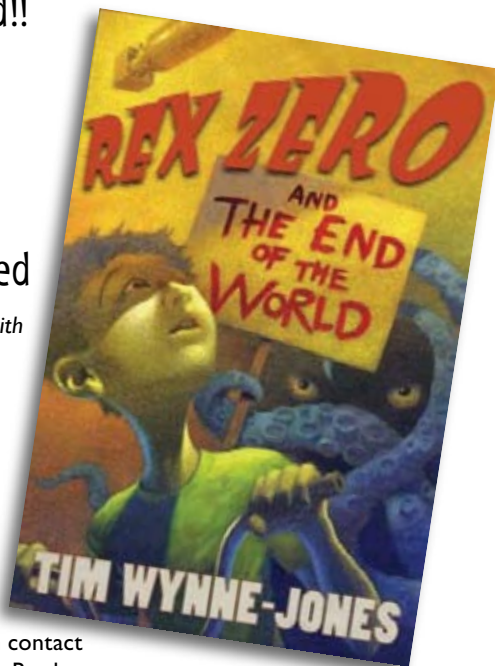

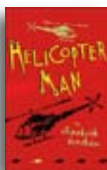

The Crazy Man

After Emaline, 11, is crippled by an accident with her father's tractor in 1965, her father kills her beloved dog, Prince, and walks away from the farm on the Saskatchewan prairie. Her mother takes in Angus from the local mental hospital to help with the farm work, but the neighbours jeer and complain about the "sub-human" crazy man on the loose. Emaline never denies Angus' illness, but she sees his kindness and strength, and they help each other with their work and with their grief. Narrated by Emaline in short lines of free verse.

Author: Catherine Ryan Hyde

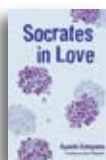
